The Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA) is the official humanitarian agency of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. ADRA Australia works as part of the global ADRA network, which extends into more than 100 countries.

CEO Statement

Dear ADRA friends,

I love travelling and learning about people and cultures but for whatever reason I'm usually not attracted to traditional souvenirs. I tend to pay more attention to natural objects like fossils, rocks and the like.

A few years back, I travelled to Madagascar and it was there that I discovered a truly unique souvenir: an elephant bird egg.

The elephant bird is an extinct flightless bird that once lived in Madagascar. It was similar in shape to an ostrich, but deemed to be much taller, standing at 3m high. Consequently, the elephant bird egg is not insignificant in size. So when I saw an elephant bird egg in a souvenir store, I knew that this egg from a now extinct bird was a souvenir I would value for years to come.

The egg I bought was not intact when it was discovered. It had been found in fragments and pieced back together. But those fragments combined created the most valuable souvenir, and without each part, the egg would not be the same. Each piece, regardless of its size or shape, came together to form the egg in its entirety.

The same is true of many things in life. I think of the Bible, and the many different books, messages, and promises that we have been given, all combined in the one holy book. Each book was included for a reason, each providing a piece of the whole picture.

I also see this in the ADRA family. Within the office, I see the various roles of my colleagues meshing together, from our programs managers to the finance team who are stewards of the donations we receive. But nothing at ADRA would happen if it was just the team in the office. Our volunteers are the lifeblood of our organisation,

offering their time and talents within Australia. Without them, we would not be able to deliver our National Programs which are helping almost 250,000 Aussies in need who would otherwise fall through the cracks. Without our partners in each country, we would not be able to deliver our life-changing development programs which are lifting entire communities out of poverty.

Shupikai's Story

Shupikai and her family were living hand to mouth, barely able to afford money for food and school fees. Her only means of survival was her farming, but it wasn't enough. With ADRA's help, Shupikai received access to the loan she needed to start a chicken farming project.

"ADRA taught us better farming methods and also taught us to rear animals properly," Shupikai says. "I borrowed money and invested in a chicken project. We have also been able to buy fertilisers to boost our farming project."

Together with ADRA's animal rearing and farming training, Shupikai repaid her loan and can now support her family.

"I am so happy that I can engage in projects to better my life and that of my family."


Health

With good health, people can live life to the fullest. That's why we work with communities to provide access to clean water, improve sanitation and hygiene, reduce malnutrition and prevent diseases. Some examples include:

Providing floating latrines for communities in Cambodia that live on the lake. Coaching and mentoring health providers in disadvantaged and marginalised communities in Nepal. And in Vanuatu, domestic and gender-based violence is being addressed through an inmate rehabilitation program, helping educate inmates so they are less likely to offend when released.

Livelihoods

With opportunities to earn a living, people can provide for their families and send their children to school. That's why we work with families to start and grow small businesses that benefit themselves, the community and the environment. Some examples include:

People with disability in Zimbabwe received support through Village Savings and Loans Associations and Farmer Market Schools, helping them to access funds to kickstart their farming projects. Farmers in Cambodia learned to produce compost fertiliser and natural insecticide which is increasing their yields. And in Nepal, men and women are learning agricultural skills, such as planting vegetables, so they can work and support their family from home without migrating for work.

Disasters

When people are supported before, during and after a disaster, they are more likely to survive and recover. That's why we work with communities to protect lives, provide emergency shelter kits and food supplies, and rebuild livelihoods. Some examples include:

Evacuating displaced people from the conflict in Ukraine and providing food, shelter and other essential services to refugees as they arrived in surrounding countries. In Tonga, cash gifts were given to vulnerable families affected by a volcano eruption and subsequent tsunami, allowing families to meet their most urgent needs, whether that is access to clean water, shelter or food. And in response to the 7.2 magnitude earthquake in Haiti, ADRA provided food, water and shelter packs to those affected.

In one day, Andrea's world turned upside down. Falling suddenly ill on her way to work, Andrea took herself to the hospital. After eight months of tests and hospital stays, Andrea was diagnosed with a rare genetic disorder that causes a variety of neurological problems.


"I was in hospital and rehab for eight months having to learn how to do everything again: walk, talk, speak, make a cup of tea," Andrea says.

No longer able to work, Andrea was at risk of social isolation. So her support worker introduced her to ADRA. Volunteering with ADRA was the first step for Andrea to kick-start her life again. "The more I was there, the more I was helping myself," Andrea says. "I've loved every moment."

Program Overview



Disasters

Within the 2021-22 year, ADRA Australia responded to the devastating flooding events that covered much NSW and QLD.

ADRA supported those affected with a variety of immediate response activities as well as implementing and planning long-term recovery efforts. Together with local Seventh-day Adventist Churches, ADRA responded by providing cash grants, emergency food hampers, house repairs, livestock feed and psychosocial support to those affected.

Impact Story – Health

Gauri was married off at just 13 years of age.

Living in rural Nepal, this is sadly the case for far too many girls just like Gauri. But with girls married off at such a young age, they often don't know their rights, let alone how to exercise them. And as such, girls like Gauri never learn about gender equality and gender-based violence.

At 27 years of age, Gauri participated in her local ADRA farmer group program. Through this program, not only did Gauri learn more about income generation and enterprises, but she learned things she was never taught as a girl. After the advocacy campaigns facilitated by ADRA, Gauri was motivated to work in human rights and to stand up against violence.

Now, Gauri is working as a Women's Activist through the ADRA project, helping to facilitate gender equality activities and efforts to prevent gender-based violence. Gauri is also involved in the municipality level Gender-Based Violence control network in two districts.

So far, Gauri has facilitated five incidents of gender inequality, including referring cases to the municipal judiciary committee for further processing.

"Women are victimised in family and society because they are limited to household chores; women are not given decision making roles regarding the use of financial resources," Gauri says. "Seeing this, I decided to dedicate myself to disseminating these initiatives widely to control the violence against women and domestic violence by mobilising Women Activists."

Monitoring and Evaluation Overview


The process of monitoring and evaluation is integrated into our project design and planning to ensure continuous improvement in program delivery. Learnings from our project evaluations will be used to inform ways of working for new and ongoing projects. Below is a selection of project evaluations and the outcomes they achieved.

Health

The HaHan project in Timor-Leste is supporting the development of marketable food production and water supply in four villages. Farmers are gaining skills and assets supporting vegetable, chicken and fish production, increasing household food security and providing livelihood opportunities. In the last 12 months, the project saw a 359.7% increase in the quantity of commercial food produced among project participants. Further, 5,848 people received access to safe water.




Livelihoods

GOAL II is a project in Nepal which aims to empower women and increase the income of poor and vulnerable people through resilient and market-led livelihood options, business development services, leadership development, and the promotion of gender equality. In the last 12 months, 2,582 Farmer Group members have been trained in improved agriculture and livestock practices. There were 795 participants trained on gender equality, and 84% of the local committee executive positions were held by women.

Disasters

ADRA was involved in the Disaster READY project in Fiji, which aims to prepare and equip communities for times of disaster. One outcome of the project was to ensure the rights and needs of women, people with disabilities, youth and children are being met in disaster preparedness and response at all levels. The Women in Leadership training had over 700 participants in the four divisions around the country. Now, women are participating at national, divisional and community levels of disaster preparedness activities. Additionally, ten church facilities were retrofitted to allow safe and inclusive access so they may be utilised as accessible evacuation centres. With the influence of the church in Fiji, it was important that these church facilities lead by example.

Shila's Story

Shila was married at 16. Early marriages in places like Nepal naturally lead to pregnancy at a young age. And when they do, they don't just have one child – they quickly build a family that can support them later in life. The problem is, for girls like Shila, they often fail to recover properly due to short gaps between their pregnancies.

During the birth of her fourth daughter, Shila noticed something very wrong throughout her contractions. She saw and felt her uterus falling out of her vagina. Not only was this incredibly painful, but Shila suffered in silence, unaware that it was treatable.

Despite living with her painful prolapse, Shila and her husband agreed they were missing something – a son. And so, Shila fell pregnant again.

It wasn't until Shila took her son to receive immunisations that her condition was recognised, and she learned something could be done. At the time, the health workers discovered Shila had a third degree prolapse with significant lacerations and bleeding.

Thanks to Open Heart International's Women's Health and Systems Strengthening (WHaSS) project, Shila was able to access life-changing prolapse surgery. Her pain was gone, and her confidence returned.

"I was unable to make a living," Shila says. "It is a matter of great fortune that free surgery has been given to a poor person like me. Thank you for giving me a second life!"

Open Heart International is a partnership of ADRA Australia and Sydney Adventist Hospital, and brings modern surgery, training, community education and equipment to some of the world's most disadvantaged communities. This is achieved by deploying teams of medical professionals to communities, who deliver education and surgery.

Open Heart International's Nepal Women's Health medical project has been collaborating with ADRA on the Women's Health and System Strengthening (WHaSS) project, funded by the Australian Government through the Australian NGO Cooperation Program (ANCP). The project aims to improve the health of women impacted by pelvic organ prolapse in the disadvantaged and marginalised communities in Nepal. This included women receiving surgery, training health care workers on conservation management, community awareness, cervical cancer screening, and responding to gender-based violence. In the last 12 months, this project reached a total of 5,205 women and men.

While COVID-19 paused Open Heart International medical trips, it did not stop their work. If anything, this period of change has emphasised how important the training component of their work is. Open Heart International is now focusing on how they can strengthen clinical capacity development and health systems in the countries they operate in so the work can continue long after a project trip.

Governance

ADRA Australia's Board is accountable to the local ADRA constituency to achieve the purpose outlined in the company Constitution: to reduce poverty by serving people and communities in need, by the provision of humanitarian, development and relief assistance in Australia and overseas, without regard to ethnic, political, racial or religious association. The Board oversees the direction of the organisation and monitors performance against the strategic plan. It has overall responsibility for managing risks and complying with legislation. It determines operating policy, approves plans, activities and the appointment of key personnel. ADRA Australia's Board met four times in 2021-22.

Financial Summary

Despite the abrupt changes brought on by the global health crisis, ADRA Australia still remains in a strong financial position as reflected in the 2021-22 Financial Statements presented in this annual report.

Revenue

ADRA Australia's overall revenue increased by \$5.17 million (24.7%) in 2021-22 to \$26.14 million compared to \$20.97 million in 2020-21. Total expenditure increased by \$4.57 million (24.7%) in 2021-22 to \$23.10 million compared to \$18.53 million in 2020-21.

Details of the Income Statement are as follows:

- Donations and gifts – cash donations and gifts increased by \$1.2 million (19.8%).
- ADRA was again blessed with generous bequests in 2021-2022.
- Non-monetary income from donated goods and services decreased by \$3.44k (-70.8%) for overseas projects due to the ongoing COVID-19 restrictions and increased by \$4.34 million (85.0%) for national projects due to increased demand on community and emergency relief services as a result of the impact of COVID-19 and increased cost of living.
- Grants from the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade decreased by \$859k (-12.7%) to \$5.92 million compared to \$6.78 million in 2020-21.

Expenditure

International Programs:

- Funds to international projects decreased by \$228k (-3.0%) compared to 2020-21.
- Fundraising costs decreased by \$5k compared to 2020-21.
- Accountability and administration costs increased by \$159k due to a once off write-off of intangible assets.
- Non-monetary expenditure decreased by \$3.44k due to COVID-19 related travel restrictions for Open Heart International projects.


National Programs:

- National programs expenditure increased by \$4.57 million due to an increased demand on community and emergency relief services as a result of the impact of COVID-19 and increased cost of living.






